Part A: Pupil premium strategy plan

Statement of intent

When deciding how to allocate our PP funding we considered school context and the challenges that our families face at Longparish as well as research conducted by the EEF. Barriers to learning that are common amongst PP children include; poor communication and language skills, confidence, behaviour, attendance and less home support.

Demography and school context: Longparish C of E Primary School is a small village church school in Longparish, located in Hampshire. It primarily serves the villages of Longparish and Hurstbourne Priors, and welcomes children from the surrounding areas, including Andover and Whitchurch. The school is extremely fortunate to have a wonderful setting, with large, secure school grounds, which provides many opportunities for the children. When looking at the indices of deprivation the area surrounding Longparish Primary School is affluent and the income, employment, health, education and crime deprivation indicators are all very low.

Ultimate objectives:

- To achieve ARE or higher in Reading, Writing and Maths and ARE in all other subjects
- To support wellbeing and mental health of pupils as qualifying for Pupil Premium or Service

Achieving these objectives

The strategies that we have decided to use include:

- Ensuring QFT in all classrooms
- LSA support
- Small group sessions to focus on accelerating progress with the aim to move children to ARE or higher
- ELSA support
- Use of specialist teacher PE provision
- Music provision- every child has the opportunity to play a musical instrument in Years 3 and 4
- Support by meeting some of the costs of educational visits and residential visits to ensure cultural capital

Challenges
